The Calling of God Pastor Hlatshwayo

My name is Sifiso Hlatshwayo, a founding Pastor of the Grace Fellowship Church and a resident Pastor at Nakekela. I was born in Breyten, Mpumalanga and later relocated to Kwa-Mhlanga to pursue my Theological studies.

My first visit to Nakekela (2005) was when I was still a student at Mukhanyo, the purpose was to do research relating to my studies, but I ended up preaching to the patients telling them about God's love, forgiveness, the salvation and hope that are found in accepting Jesus as Lord and Savior. The response was so overwhelming that the patients requested me to come more often, a request I forwarded to the then centre Manager and she gladly approved it.

That marked the beginning of my ministry at Nakekela, a ministry I have been doing for over a decade now. It is worth noting that when I started ministering to the patients the stigma around the disease and the centre was very rife, very few people then would risk coming near the centre and the patients. But regardless of what other people were saying including fellow pastors at the College, I continued ministering, because to me it felt as a calling and I also felt I had no choice but to obey God. I love the work am doing at Nakekela. It is a special kind of ministry. I also cherish the relationship that I have built with my colleagues and the current and former patients.

Report from Home Based Care

Martha Mtshweni, one of the Home Based Care workers had a patient in the field whose house burned down. The woman with two of her children nearly died in the house when her ex-husband had set it on fire. The children were still at home, preparing for school when the incident happened.

The woman had to climb through a window and got hurt. She was assisted by her neighbours to go to the hospital. Her two daughters were by the grace of God able to escape the fire, unfortunately her ex-husband died in the blaze. It is so sad that now they have to start from the beginning as they have lost all their earthly possessions.

One of the children affected by the tradegy, a young boy did not understand the concept of death and feared his father would come back to hurt him. The woman and her daughters also had nightmares following the incident. The counsellor at Nakekela, Letty Tjiane, had two counselling sessions with the family to set them at ease. The counselling relieved them of so many of their fears that the one daughter requested another visit. The little boy also highlighted that the reading of the Word of God and the prayer helped him a lot to cope.

Our counsellor also thanked God that He protected the family. Nakekela was also able to provide them with clothes and blankets to try and restore their life to what is was earlier.
