WORD FOR TODAY BY REV PAUL MAHLANGU

Love God truthfully and you will love man genuinely Matthew 22:35-39

In our mentorship class, we recently discussed sin, asking ourselves which sins are greater and which sins are smaller. We concluded that before God, sin is sin and God hates all sin. There is no such thing as smaller sin or bigger sin. Often in our actions we live in a way that suggests that there are smaller sins and bigger sins. So what we constantly declare with our mouth is in many cases contrary to what we actually do.

Lawyer: Teacher, which is the great commandment in the law?

The reason people wanted to know the greater of the laws is they felt that they were not going to be able to keep all the laws, and therefore they wanted to know which ones were more important so that when they kept the important laws, they will be regarded as having kept all the laws. This is contrary to the understanding of the apostle James. The Bible says that when you break one law you have broken all laws (James 2:10-11).

The Bible says this man, a lawyer, was testing or trying Jesus. Being a lawyer, he thought he knew the answer. The debate about which law is the most important was great among the lawyers of that time and whatever answer Jesus would give, He would show himself to be on one side or the other. Jesus gave his questioners more than what they had bargained for. He answered their question and then He went on to give them a second law, one that is equally important.

Jesus said "Love God with all your heart, soul, mind and strength' and He said "love your neighbour as yourself'.

Jesus is effectively saying all the Ten Commandments are important. The first four commandments say love God (vertical) and the last six say love your fellow man (horizontal).

God wants us to love Him and to love our fellow men. What does it mean to love God and what does it mean to love your neighbour? Jesus answered the question.

Love God with all your heart, soul, mind and strength

- 1. With all your heart: nothing in comparison to him, you are ready to give up, do, or suffer any thing in order to please and glorify him: Think of Joseph when tempted by Potiphar's wife. He refused to commit adultery with her, saying, "How then can I do this great wickedness, and sin against God?" Gen. 39:9. Loving God with your whole heart makes you hate sin because it separates you from Him.
- 2. **With all your soul**, or rather your life: Ready to give up life for his sake, to endure all sorts of torments, and to be deprived of all kinds of comforts, rather than dishonouring God. Think of the martyrs about whom it is said that their blood became the seed of the Church. *They overcame through the blood of the Lamb, and loved not their lives unto death,* Rev. 12:11.
- 3. With all your strength (Mark 12:30; Luke 10:27): Exert all the power of your body and soul in the service of God. Sacrifice your time, body, health, ease, for the honour of God, your Divine Master. Employ in your service all your goods, talents, power, authority, and influence to the glory of God. We can best demonstrate this in our freewill offerings, for the church, the ministry and for the needy. Give and do not expect anything in return.
- 4. **With all your mind**: apply yourself only to know God, and his holy will. Banish from your understanding and memory every useless, foolish, and dangerous thought, together with every idea which has any tendency to defile your soul.

Keeping the first four commandments would be the full expression of this love for God. Then Jesus went on to tell this man and the Pharisees the second important law. This will be concluded in the next newsletter.
